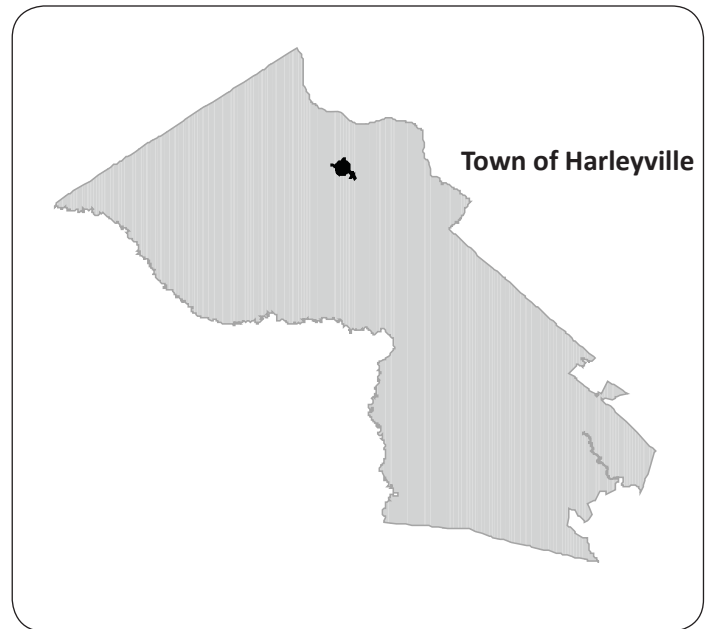

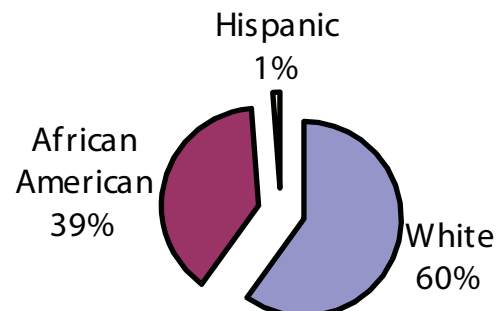

DECEMBER IN U.S. HISTORY (Source: Library of Congress)

January 1, 1892: The first of the more than 12 million immigrants who would pass through the doors of the Ellis Island Immigration Station in its 62 years of operation arrived on this day.

January 4, 1865: The New York Stock Exchange opened its first permanent headquarters at 10-12 Broad near Wall Street in New York City.

January 6, 1945: George Herbert Walker Bush married Barbara Pierce, who left her studies at Smith College to marry the future president.

January 7, 2002: Shirley Franklin is sworn in as the first African American Mayor of Atlanta and the only African American female mayor of a major American city.

January 8, 1836 Educator and first Black woman college graduate in the US, Fannie M. Jackson was born.

January 9, 1788: Connecticut ratified the Constitution and became the 5th state.

January 10, 1861: Delegates to the Florida Convention in Tallahassee voted to secede from the Union.

January 12, 1737: John Hancock, most often remembered for the large bold signature with which he signed the Declaration of Independence, was born.

January 14, 1784: The Continental Congress ratified the Treaty of Paris officially establishing the United States as an independent and sovereign nation.

January 15, 1929: Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., a major voice for civil rights in the 20th century, was born in Atlanta, Georgia.

January 17, 1706: Benjamin Franklin born in Boston, Massachusetts.

January 18, 1896: University of Iowa played University of Chicago in the first college basketball game with five players on each side.

January 20, 1937: Franklin D. Roosevelt began his second term, becoming the first U.S. president to be sworn into office in January.

January 22, 1912: Residents of Key West, Florida observed completion of the Florida East Coast Railway, an overseas rail connection to the mainland.

January 30, 1844: Richard Theodore Greener becomes the first African American to graduate from Harvard University.
